Cubans got together to end slavery. Unfortunately, their valiant effort was quickly crushed by Spanish troops.

Fast forward a bit to 1898, the Cubans were still fighting the Spanish. But Cuba's northern neighbor, the United States, helped them gain independence in 1953. But 'independence' can mean different things to different people.

Consequently the US pretty much controlled Cuba after its 'independence' and helped install a man named <u>Bautista</u> as President by using an efficient shortcut to democracy known as a 'military coup'.

Bautista had already been President of Cuba previously, and was not universally loved as a dictatorial President the second time. He was especially unloved by the young beardless illegitimate son of a wealthy farmer named **Fidel Castro**.

On July 26, 1953 Castro decided he just wasn't having it. So he and some others drove 16 cars into Santiago de Cuba (the second largest city in Cuba) and

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attacked a barracks in hopes of absconding with the weapons inside.

The adventure didn't turn out well, many were killed or captured (and then executed). But Castro and his brother **Raul** were spared death's inconvenience.

Castro, who had studied law, defended himself in court. The net result was that he was thrown into prison for a twenty year term. But then, a few years later, President Bautista released a number of political prisoners. Unfortunately for President Bautista, two of them were Fidel and Raul Castro.

The brothers immediately left Cuba for Mexico, obtained a 12person yacht called the Granma into which they stuffed at least 80 people, and then headed back to Cuba to take part in a planned coup.

But with 80 people on a 12person yacht they arrived days after the coup had already petered out. They were intercepted by the Bautista government and fled inland. Only 19 revolutionaries made it, the rest were killed or captured.

Fidel and Raul survived by fleeing to the mountains and managing the revolution from afar. Working with others, including a seemingly rogue CIA operative who understood military tactics, Fidel and Raul Castro orchestrated the Cuban revolution.

They, along with <u>Che</u> <u>Guevara</u> defeated the capitalist dogs. On January 1st, 1959 Bautista gathered up some traveling money (about \$300,000,000) and left Cuba for the USA. ¡Viva la revolución!

Castro's utopian workers paradise was not without its challenges. Three years after the revolution, a paranoid Castro executed the CIA operative who had helped him plan and win the revolution.

A few years after that, the CIA sponsored <u>Bay of Pigs</u> occurred where US forces were defeated by Cuban forces while attempting regime change in Cuba; today school kids in Cuba get three days off to celebrate the overthrow of the 'American Imperialists.'

At the time, the US was the number one trading partner with Cuba. But eventually America got serious with an embargo. Russia took the opportunity to step in and filled the vacuum caused by the departure of US trade, saying they would buy all of the products Cuba had sold to the US (and they would throw in some nuclear missiles at no additional charge).

The Cuban Missile Crisis, tighter embargoes, money transfer and travel restrictions for Cuban Americans ensued. Then, in the 1990s, Russia told Castro they could no longer support Cuba, so the foreign supported Cuban economy collapsed.

Fidel called this the 'special period' and (wait for it...) blamed the United States for their troubles. But Hugo Chavez of Venezuela came to Cuba's rescue in what is known as the 'Pink Tide.' Apparently, Cuba has a lot of doctors; Venezuela has a lot of oil. The two began a 'trading doctors for oil' program. The oil injection was enough to restart the heart of the Cuban economy.

In 2006, the US started broadcasting ticker-tape type messages on the side of a Havana building rented from the Swiss.



Two years later, on February 20, 2008, Raul Castro took over for his brother Fidel. Things started to get better and then some other fascinating things happened and, well, here we are.


• February 8: Work Party at Terwilliger Marsh.CANCELLED DUE TO RAIN!!!!!!
