#### **PROGRAM**

■ Oak Dowling was our speaker and Al Capone his subject. Born in Brooklyn, New York, to poor Italian immigrants, Capone dropped out of school at age 13, took to the streets, became a bouncer and joined the Cosimo mob. Eventually he became the most famous and sought after mobster in American history.

While flirting with a good looking lady in a nightclub, her suitor pulled a knife on him and slashed the left side of his face. A long scar remained and hence the nickname "Scarface".

# PROGRAM (Cont'd)

Al Capone moved to Chicago at the time of prohibition and took over the mob at age 25. During his 6 year reign he oversaw 30.000 speakeasies, promoted jazz and many black performers.

One of his more famous crimes was the Valentine's Day Massacre. He dressed his men in police uniforms and gunned down seven men of the opposing Moran Gang. He was arrested several times, served short prison sentences and was released for good behavior.

Finally an elite group of Chicago business men formed the "Secret Six", and brought criminal charges against him for tax evasion during the years of 1925-1929. He was convicted in 1931, sentenced to eleven years in Federal prison and in addition to fines and court costs was ordered to pay \$125,000 for back taxes plus interest. His appeals were denied and in 1934 Al Capone was transferred to Alcatraz.

After serving 71/2 years on the "Rock" he was released and diagnosed with brain damage and syphilis. He subsequently died in Florida in 1947 from a stroke.

His reputation as America's most notorious gangster of the 20th Century remains and has been subject of numerous articles, books, films and legends.



The elder Patton gained renown during World War II as a fearless commander devoted to his men. A complex figure driven by his knowledge of history and warfare, he was a professional soldier who loved the art of war and hated war itself. The younger Patton also lived an eventful life: he participated in the Berlin Airlift, served in Korea, and proved his valor during three tours of duty in Vietnam
