December 15: Holiday Luncheon. We will celebrate the holiday season at





This also the title of his intensely personal documentary film about a band of neo-Nazi thugs that threatened to march in the quiet village of Skokie, Illinois in 1977. At that time about 7,000-8,000 former Holocaust survivors lived in Skokie. They survived the horrors of the Holocaust and came to America to put the past behind. For decades they kept their awful memories secret, even from their
