PROGRAM

■ Elizabeth Suzuki introduced our speaker today. Allely Albert is a recently returned Peace Corps volunteer, originally from Mill Valley. She graduated from Willamette University in Salem, OR., where she studied French and American studies.

Allely was admitted into the Peace Corps and began her service in Cameroon in September 2013. She lived in a remote village in the South West Region of Cameroon in Central Africa for over two years conducting health education.

She spearheaded a variety of health campaigns while she was there, ranging from nutrition to epilepsy to water sanitation. She also extended her service for several months and finally returned to the U.S. in late January 2016.


Cameroon was colonized by the British and French, both languages are spoken as well as the regional dialects. Each volunteer has to live with a local family for two months for training purposes.

The trip to reach her village was not easy. The roads where very bad and to reach her post she had to hire a motorcycle driver, (Uber

was not available!) sit on the backseat with all her belongings, and it is common knowledge that the motorcycle drivers often like to get quite tipsy before and during the journey.

In her village, Wong Bang, lived about 3.000 people, mostly coffee farmers, and desperately in need for better distribution. Housing is very poor and primitive, a little better for government workers, running water was available, but freezing cold.

One of her tasks was to make daily visits to the health center, where she taught better nutrition, gave HIV education and even distributed free condoms. Epilepsy is associated with witchcraft over there, and can be fatal while cooking or doing other chores.

Also, since drinking is rampant among motorcycle drivers she held classes on this subject and achieved a considerable decrease in their intake.

Before she arrived, water had to be carried back to the village and was not treated. Through generous funding two new systems could be

created to treat water from the river. It brought new life to the village. Also better export for the coffee has to be developed, the existence of third party buyers leaves no room for profit,

Her most gratifying experience was the kindness of the people, their hospitality and generosity of sharing all they had. Most important to them was their life, the people around them and togetherness, treating everyone as an intimate member of their family.

What was most important to Allely? Empowering people, learning about other countries,

sharing with Americans what life over there is like and bring the experience back.


