## **GOOD TIMES**


- **Doug** an his wife **Linda** had great fun listening to their granddaughter playing a percussion instrument in a band as a leader.

February 27 (12:15): Oak
Dowling will tell us about Rosa
Parks: An International Icon of
Resistance to Racial Segregation.
By refusing to give up her seat to
a white man on a Montgomery,
Alabama, city bus in 1955, black
seamstress Rosa Parks helped
initiate the civil rights movement
in the United States. The leaders
of the local black community
organized a bus boycott that
began the day Parks was

convicted of violating the segregation laws. Led by a young Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., the boycott lasted more than a year—during which Parks not coincidentally lost her job—and ended only when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that bus segregation was unconstitutional. Over the next half-century, Parks became a nationally recognized symbol of dignity and strength in the struggle to end entrenched racial segregation. The US Congress called her "the first lady of civil rights" and "the mother of the freedom movement."

March 6 (12:15): Dr. Rich Moran, President Emeritus of Menlo College, will talk about The Accidental Vineyard. A baby who wouldn't sleep began the Moran family sojourn into the wine business. Rich and his wife Carol took their kids for a drive into wine country and discovered a beautiful large old Victorian home in the middle of a beautiful valley, and it just happened to be for sale. They bought the property

# CLUB'S 9TH PEACE CORPS PROJECT IS COMPLETED IN PERU

❖ Huishcabamba is a small rural community of 11 families situated high in the northern Andes of Peru. All of the families and houses lack sewage systems, bathrooms and running water. Families depend on nearby streams and springs for consumption and use. Open fields and backyards are used as bathrooms. A study by the Peace Corps volunteer found that 100% of the households had at least one member experiencing monthly symptoms of diarrhea, vomiting, fever and respiratory infections.

The families took it upon themselves to attack the problem. A committee was formed in 2016. The

community educated itself and came up with a plan to build a sustainable bathroom and sewage treatment project. The plan required each family to sign a contract and participate in behavioral change workshops covering hygiene, household water treatment and storage and bio-digesting waste management. They were also required to provide the sweat equity necessary for the construction of the improvements. With support of the Peace Corps volunteer and the local councilman the community was able to obtain local funding of \$2,885.

The project was completed in December 2017.
