development with ocean sustainability and conservation. Their current efforts are concentrated in Baja California where over fishing and the consequent marine sanctuary areas have devastated small coastal communities by taking away their livelihood.

Olazul's answer is to aid those communities in developing viable and sustainable marine operations that aid the ocean environment and allow the residents to make a living. Two examples are growing seaweed and growing profile sea life such as clams, scallops and other bi valves.

The organization is only 5 years old and has a very small budget but is helping to make the connection for the coastal communities between sustainability and economic development. Jos' presentation was very thought provoking and a new angle on the relationship of economic development and conservation For more information go to their website, olazul.org.

defy U.S. government curfew and "evacuation" orders issued in 1942 (in the context of World War II) to persons of Japanese ancestry who lived on the West Coast. Hirabayashi considered the orders to be a gross violation of Constitutional rights. He was arrested, convicted, and imprisoned for a year, and eventually appealed his case to the U.S. Supreme Court. Although the Supreme Court upheld his

The sole purpose of a child's middle name is so he can tell when he's really in trouble. conviction at the time, the fight to overturn it resumed in the 1980s, culminating in his judicial vindication. In 2012 Hirabayashi was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.
