

Progress reports have been received from three projects in South America, all of which are supported in some fashion by funds contributed by members of Mill Valley Rotary.

At top is a photo of a recently completed waste water system at an orphanage in Ambato, Ecuador. This was a project of the Marin Evening club to which we contributed \$2,000.

At right, a plumbing class is underway at the training center which is a part of the Esmeraldas, Ecuador Microcredit Rotary Global Grant to which we contributed \$21,000.

And at bottom Peace Corps volunteer **Bryan LaRosa** stands next to one of 15 bathrooms that are being constructed in Miramar, Peru. Forty percent of the cost of the project was funded through the Peace Corps Partnership Program (PCPP) to which Mill Valley Rotary contributed \$4,317.85.

Your dollars are doing good work Keep them coming!






was seated next to him at lunch today and was mighty disappointed that the cruise was unable to stop at Cornwall. Wales is a poor substitute!

PROGRAM

Today's speaker, **Dr. David E. Smith**, award winning founder of the Haight-Ashbury free medical clinics in San Francisco, had a very sobering and important message. Too bad your reporter, who was sitting in the back of the room and has 82-year-old ears to boot, could only hear snippets of his talk.

What I got from his talk was that drug and alcohol addiction among middle-class adolescents is a big problem, and he wants Rotarians to get involved in finding solutions.

In addition to his work at the Haight-Ashbury clinics, Dr. Smith is involved with Muir Wood Adolescent and Family Services, an organization with an outpatient program for boys and girls in San Rafael and a residential program for boys only in Petaluma.

He will share with us the incredible civil rights story of his uncle **Gordon Hirabayashi**, one of a handful of Japanese Americans nationwide to defy U.S. government curfew and "evacuation" orders issued in 1942. He was arrested, convicted, and imprisoned for a year, and eventually appealed his case to

the U.S. Supreme Court. Although the Supreme Court upheld his conviction at the time, the fight to overturn it resumed in the 1980s, culminating in his judicial vindication. In 2012 Hirabayashi was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

September 8: Ali Rezaian will speak on the Non-Freedom of the *Press in Iran*. Ali is the brother of iournalist Jason Rezaian. Ali will talk about his brother's detention in Iran. Jason is a journalist currently employed as The Washington Post bureau chief in Tehran, Iran. On July 22, 2014, Iranian authorities raided the Tehran residence of Jason Rezaian and his wife, Yeganeh Salehi, and took the couple into custody. On October 6, Salehi – who is also a iournalist – was released, but Jason Rezaian remains in custody.
