North Korea: The Hermit Kingdom. He focused on the history, politics and everyday life in the totalitarian society under the Kim Family Dynasty (Kim Il Sung, Kim Jong-Il, and Kim Jong-Un).

Bob detailed some of the disparities regarding life expectancy, infant mortality rates, GDP, exports, military size, military budgets between North and South Korea.

His slides included the Demilitarized Zone between North and South Korea, the Joint Security Area, an Invasion Tunnel, the USS Pueblo, Revolutionary billboards, the Bridge of No Return, the massive mausoleum of Kim Il Sung & Kim Jong-Il, the Arirang Mass Games, Pyongyang and most importantly the North Korean people.
