■ Robert Heller, in spite of a brief equipment failure, did a slide presentation on his fascinating life as written in his autobiography, *The Unlikely Governor*, a story of an American immigrant's ascent from the cellars and caves of wartime Germany to becoming a governor of the Federal Reserve Board and the President of VISA.

Born in 1940 to a family of distillers in Cologne, **Bob** had an

idyllic childhood helping his grandparents make peppermint schnapps in their cellars, which doubled as an air raid shelter during Allied bombardments of 30 million pounds of bombs on Cologne.

In spite of the horror of homes and businesses collapsing, there was a competition among German cities to claim the honor of which one survived the worst bombardments.

Emigrating from Germany to the US in 1960, Bob went to Parsons College, a largely discredited school, but managed to get an easy degree before he earned his PhD in economics at Cal during the Free Speech Movement. After that, he taught Econ at UCLA during the Watts riots, SDS (Students for a Democratic Society), and the Black Students Union's bombing of the Econ department.

Moving on to the IMF, which collapsed after Nixon moved the US off the gold standard. Next job was at the Bank of America in 1978 until the bank went bankrupt whereupon he moved to the Federal Reserve where he presided

Mill Valley Rotary-Peace Corps Peru Projects

Progress Report: Chequepe, Virú (La Libertad) Toilets

The entire community of Chequepe uses open water wells as their water source and 75% of the community uses latrines and the other 25% practices open defecation. The use of latrines and the practice of open defecation have contaminated the environment as well as open water wells, consequently causing childhood illnesses. The first

objective of this project is to decrease the communities and environments exposure to contaminants by constructing 10 ecological bathrooms. Their design renders the urine and feces safe for reuse; then using the safe products for agricultural purposes. Another objective is to educate the community on the routes of contamination, water well maintenance, proper hand washing, water storage and treatment, how to use and maintain the bathrooms, and prevention of childhood illnesses. The community of Chequepe is very enthusiastic about this project.

Each participating house will pay S/100 (\$26) towards the ecological bathroom, buy the materials to construct the walls of the bathroom, will provide a helper to build the bathroom and prepare the area where the bathroom will be built. The local municipality will be helping with the costs of sand, gravel, bricks and cement needed for construction.

On January 11th construction of the 10 ecological bathrooms began. With the help of the municipality, a local mason and the community we should have the 10 bathrooms fully constructed by February 26th. Based on the current budget, and not having any further costs, three to four additional ecological bathrooms can be constructed.

Total projected cost \$5,908. Mill Valley Rotary Club's contribution is \$3,538.

he was a professional soldier who loved the art of war and hated war itself. The younger Patton also lived an eventful life; he participated in the Berlin Airlift, served in Korea, and proved his valor during three tours of duty in Vietnam.

March 15: **Oak Dowling** will talk about *Bernard L. Madoff and the Largest Financial Fraud in History.* Madoff committed the largest financial fraud in history with losses totaling over \$65 billion. In 2008 he was sentenced to 150 years in Federal prison. In the mid-1960s, Bernard Madoff tapped money at exclusive country clubs with the promise of steady guaranteed returns on their investments. He then set his sights on Europe and Latin America, brokering deals with powerful hedge fund managers and feeder funds from Buenos Aires to Geneva. Next it was charities and union retirement funds. Billions of dollars were channeled to Madoff's investment firm, and his feeders became fabulously wealthy. The competition wondered how the man could produce such steady returns in good times and bad.
