# PROGRAM (Cont'd)

San Francisco and provides architecture, interior design and landscape services for custom homes, restaurants, retail, hotels and schools. He also was the project architect for the late **Aaron Green**, the last living link to **Frank Lloyd Wright**'s organic school of architecture.

His presentation focused on the different styles and periods of Victorian houses, many of them in San Francisco.

#### **Gothic Revival (1840-1890)**

Characteristics: painted arches over doors and windows, steeply pitched roofs, turrets, pinnacles and leaded glass windows. It was followed by Carpenter Gothic, of mostly wooden structures, slightly more modest dwellings with simpler adornments.

#### Italianate (1850-1890)

Characteristics: Almost always two to three stories high, made of wood to imitate stone with stained

bay windows as well as narrow windows with curved or arched top. These houses also feature flat or pitched roofs and pediments above doorways and windows.

#### Stick (1860-1870)

Characteristics: they have long, thin pieces of wood called "sticks", where decorative and expressed the underlying wood structure instead of imitating stone. During the 1870s another style developed, the Eastlake **Stick**, the decorative elements became exceedingly numerous and elaborate but also more classical elements where incorporated. San Francisco has the greatest concentration of these homes, due to vast local redwood forests and overwhelming amount of money from the Comstock Lode.

# **Queen Anne (1880-1910)**

Characteristics: They are easily identified, called the in-ness and out-ness. They where decorated with large bay windows, spindles, ornate details and swirls. No vacant space on the surface was left. (A good example are the "Painted Ladies" on Steiner Street.)


# PROGRAM (Cont'd)

These distinctive styles were followed by the **Arts & Crafts** movement, shingle style houses, Tudor Revival, Mission Revival, leading the way to Edwardian Craftsman and Spanish Eclectic/Mediterranean Revival until the 1940s.

Many of these houses have been carefully restored and are very much part of our San Francisco landscape.
