PROGRAM

♣ Attorney Jen Lee, who talked to us today about identity theft and how to best protect yourself from it, noted that 46% of the people in the U.S. have been victims of identity theft. It happens every two seconds, she said, and us older types are the most susceptible with 45% of the victims age 50 or older.

Jen gave us some pointers on what you can do to protect yourself from identity theft:

- ◆ Protect your mailbox;
- ◆ Be careful with what ends up in the trash;
- ◆ Protect your information on junk mail;
- ◆ Invest in a safe or firebox;
- ♦ Use varying passwords online;
- ♦ Use password managers to keep your passwords complex and safe. She recommended Lastpass and 1Password as the best choices.

Jen also noted that we should change the password to our bank account once every month!

What do you do if your identity is stolen? Jen suggests:

- ◆ Immediately report any suspicious credit card activity or identity theft;
- ◆ Create a file to stay organized;
- ◆ Place security freezes on Experian, Equifax and TransUnion;
- ♣ File identity theft report online with the FTC: www.identitytheft.gov;
- → File a police report at your local police department;

- ◆ Keep copies of your identity theft report and police report in a safe place;
- ♦ Obtain a copy of your credit report from all three agencies;
- ♦ With your credit report, review for fraudulent accounts, recent credit inquiries, addresses, and dispute if necessary.

Moore was recently hired by The Redwoods to help determine which adaptations would best serve the residents and the broader community. He




realizes that the vast majority of seniors will not move to a retirement community and plans to provide an overview of benefits and drawbacks of all options. He
