PROGRAM

Our speaker, Vicki Trapalis, an attorney who lives in Mill Valley, has dual American-Greek citizenship and she often returns to Greece to visit relatives. During her most recent journey she decided to check out one of the many refugee camps resulting from all of the turmoil in the Middle East. That experience was the subject of her talk today.

Vicki spent almost a year in Greece helping refugee children, mostly Syrians, on her own dime. She noted that there are 62,000 refugees in Greece. They are living in tents in one of the poorest countries in Europe—"not the best place to be stuck in."

She worked as a teacher of English in a camp run by the military outside Athens, a camp of 3,000 people with only 8 toilets.

She thought that when she returned to the U.S. she would see the despair in the camps reported on TV. When she did not it was shocking to her.

"We are losing a generation of young people," she said.

Vicki has promised to send a list of organizations she feels can help alleviate the situation. She leaves for Greece again for three weeks next Monday. We will pass along any information she sends.
