■ PP Bob Canepa introduced today's program *The Amazing Handkerchief: Chronicler of History, Heroism, Romance, Fashion, and Art through the Age.* Ann Mahony, is a speaker, author, and collector of all things associated with handkerchiefs. Ann's collection consists of over 5000 handkerchiefs!

Handkerchiefs began as fashion statements and a status symbol, and have even figured in literature such as Shakespeare's *Othello*.

Because of the upcoming Memorial Day holiday she focused her program on handkerchiefs in the two World Wars.

Examples included handkerchiefs given to soldiers by their sweethearts to take with them into battle, handkerchiefs worn by women at home to signify that they had a loved one serving in the wars and handkerchiefs brought home by soldiers as souveniers.

For the past seven years he has learned many of the amazing breakthroughs that allow us to finally understand our health and disease. He began to see the newest discoveries about how our cellular chemistry works and the importance of the genes in our cells. He has been able to see, over the past few years, the research science findings go quickly from the lab into the clinics. We are now seeing breakthroughs that will enable us to control many disease processes. His talk will outline the important components of our cells' function and how evidence with diet and exercise promotes the cell's normal functions and what you can do everyday to use this information.



June 7: Carlo Brayda's presentation is entitled "Destruction of a Peaceful Nation: Mussolini's Story of Treachery and Deceit in the Conquest and Colonization of Ethiopia in the 1930s." At the time of the European colonization and conquest of Africa, Italy was falling short of its imperialistic ambitions. Benito Mussolini, Italy's Prime Minister, then

Dictator, was trying to re-establish its national pride after its First World War disappointments, and its failed first attempt at invading Ethiopia in 1896, when its army was obliterated. In a desperate attempt to achieve victory, Italy unleashed its chemical weapon of mass destruction on military and civilian targets alike in utter defiance of the Geneva protocol. Carlo's grandfather-General Nassibu Zamanuel-was one of Mussolini's foremost Ethiopian adversaries who perished from mustard gas after putting up a valiant defense. General Nassibu is also remembered for having penned His Majesty, Ethiopian Emperor Haile Selassie's powerful speech to the League of Nations in 1936.

June 28: Tony Probst will tell us about the Titanic & Her Artifacts. Tony is a world traveler and a big collector of historical artifacts. RMS Titanic was a British passenger liner that sank in the North Atlantic Ocean in the early morning of April 15, 1912 after colliding with an iceberg during her maiden voyage from Southampton, UK, to New York City. The sinking resulted in the loss of more than 1,500 passengers and crew, making it one of the deadliest commercial peacetime maritime disasters in modern history.
