


MOVIE NIGHT

CLUB FUNDS SUPPORT REFUGEES

♣ Recently, the Mill Valley Rotary board of directors, responding to a request by Vicky Trapalis who spoke to the club last January about the problems of refugees in Greece, donated \$2,500 to an organization called Love Without Borders for Refugees in Need. Kayla Martinez, founder of the organization, which is based in Grandview, Missouri, sent an email thank you note to the club this past Monday in which she detailed how the funds were put to work:

♦Amvgdaleza Detention

Center: This detention center houses 500 individuals, primarily adult males, facing deportation based on negative asylum decisions. However, this center also houses 50 unaccompanied and 28 families, including women and children. Kayra has been working closely with the warden of the detention center to provide necessities to those detained that the facility is not otherwise able to provide. She spent 638.60 euro on diapers, summer shoes (flip flops) for all the residents, and toys for the children (ie., balls, cards, etc.)

♦Homeless Families: Kayra spent 320 euro to house a homeless family, consisting of a mother, father, a two-month old baby, and two children under age six. The family had spent one week sleeping outside at a local park and several weeks sleeping outside of one of the refugee camps. The boy child required immediate medical attention due to severe crusting to his feet and what appeared to be a fungus on his fingers and fingernails. Kayra also provided the family with a food stipend of 250 euro for the

month. She used an additional 320 euro for the security deposit on the apartment that she is housing them in.

♦ Nea Kavala Refugee Camp:

A woman at Nea Kavala refugee camp was released from the hospital the day after delivering her child and told to return to the camp. Kayra believed that to return to camp conditions immediately after giving birth was unreasonable and inhumane. She is housing her in a hotel for a few weeks until both her and her newborn child's health improves. She used 525 euro for the lodgings and 270 euro for food.

◆Art Supplies: Kayra explains that the children at Vial refugee camp on Chios Island have recently been exposed to additional trauma due to a violent confrontation between two ethnic groups at this camp. A Greek organization on the island

contacted her asking if she would be interested in working with the children on an art project. Kayra accepted their offer to bring an art program to the children of the camp and spent 160 euro on canvases and paints.
