
- Roberta Keller asked all to sign up today for the holiday lunch Dec. 15 at Piazza d'Angelo and choose fish, chicken or pasta.

PROGRAM

■ Local photographer/adventurers Andrea Johnson (professional fine arts photographer), Skip Sandberg (author of Steps, Lanes and Paths) and Bob Holmes (Time, Life, National Geographic) presented a photo show of their amazing Bhutan adventure.

Bhutan, an ancient kingdom, appears to be medieval but now has cell phones and cars. Trekking at 16,000 feet, they visited monasteries which had served as fortresses, school children singing "Oh My Darling Clementine," religious festivals, sacred mountains, and the one traffic light in the country.

Although Bhutan, which is primarily mountains and valleys, has 6 languages and 36 dialects, English is the common language.

PROGRAM (Cont'd)

Although geologists know that the mountains contain billions of dollars of gold, it is not mined because the mountains are sacred. The country prefers to get its wealth from hydro-electric power which it sells to India. Since the country does not allow back packers, those wishing to visit Bhutan must convince the country that they are "quality tourists" like our three amazing photographers.

JOIN THE EMERGENCY SHELTER TEAM

♦ The Rotary Club of Mill Valley is slated to host the R.E.S.T. (Rotating Emergency Shelter Team) program on Thursday, January 7th, at the Community Congregational Church, 145 Rock Hill Drive, in Tiburon. Turn left (up hill) at the traffic light at the Tennis Club., Go through one stop sigh to the top of the hill where Rock Hill Drive terminates in the CCC parking lot.

The Tasks are:

- ◆ 5:00 Set-up (pulling out air mattresses and setting tables) There are usually 18-20 men we host for the night, plus those of the team who will be eating with them.
- ◆ 5:15 Cooks (unless you need more that 45 minutes, then come earlier;
- ◆ 6:00 Welcome and eat with the houseless
- ♦ 6:30 Begin clean up. Usually we are all finished no later than 8:00 (a 3-min industrial cycle dishwasher is a real asset!). Pots, pans, plates, silverware, etc. are all there and there is a commercial stove.

We need to find a time by January 2nd to plan the menu and food acquisition.

You are welcome to sign up for all the times or just a shift. (I will be there the whole time.) About 3 people are needed for each shift—that would be two besides myself. So far **Doug Scherf** and **Keith Papulias** (who has volunteered to barbecue and provide meat) have expressed a commitment. Spouses and/or responsible children (teenage or older) are welcome to help out as well.

I will be out of town until December 19th. Please let me know by December 22 if you are interested in participating, and I will be in touch about planning a menu, etc.

Whenever I have participated, I have always found it a great experience. Looking forward to seeing who else is willing to join the team!

■ January 12: Eli Adler's presentation is entitled *Surviving Skokie*. This also the title of his intensely personal documentary film about a band of neo-Nazi thugs that threatened to march in the quiet village of Skokie, Illinois in 1977. At that time about 7,000-8,000 former Holocaust survivors lived in Skokie. They survived the

horrors of the Holocaust and came to America to put the past behind. For decades they kept their awful memories secret, even from their children. Eli will discuss these provocative events, their aftermath, his family's horrific experience of the Shoah, and a journey with his father to confront long-suppressed memories.

■ January 19: Fletcher Christian, Captain Bligh & The HMS Bounty will be the subject of **Tony** Probst's talk. Tony is a world traveler and a big collector of historical artifacts. Back in 1789, British sailors in the Pacific mutinied on the HMS Bounty and settled on Tahiti and Pitcairn Island. While the mutineers on Tahiti were later arrested by the British, those on Pitcairn were able to start a community with Tahitian companions. In 1838, the Pitcairn Islands officially became a British territory.
