SPECIAL REPORT: BOGOTA PROJECT UPDATE

■ Our Rotary microcredit project in Bogota, Colombia is proceeding nicely, reports Keith **Axtell** of Marin Evening Rotary and chair of the District 5150 Microcredit Committee. Rotary Club of Mill Valley, under the leadership of World Community Service Director Bill Lambrecht, was a co-sponsor for this project, which was organized by the District 5150 Microcredit Committee. Our partner in Colombia is the Rotary Club of Bogota Centenario.

The operating agency Mencoldes has successfully established 16 Credit Groups in low-income communities throughout the Bogota metropolitan area. These Credit Groups have an average of 5 to 8 people in each group. Ninety six poor people are now participating in this Rotary loan program.

The participants are families and individuals in vulnerable situations. Faced with a lack of job opportunities, they have become self-employed and

Thailand and the Phillipines. He arrived in the U.S. at the age of ten and ended up dumpster diving for food. With much hard work, determination, and established their own microenterprises.

Sixty one percent of the loan recipients are single women head of households. To support themselves they are engaged in the following businesses, among others: making and selling clothing and decorative items, catalog sales, marketing beauty products and services, and selling food, stationary and other supplies. One young woman is operating a nursery school which she wants to expand with future loans.

So far \$45,400 in loans have been made to these 16 credit groups. These loans are being used by the low-income recipients to establish or support their existing small businesses. As of the last report, all the loans are current in their payments. None of the loans were delinquent 30 days or more.

Keith thanked our club for giving these people in Colombia an opportunity to improve their lives through the Rotary microcredit loan program.




