- President Sue reminded the club that next Monday, November




- 11, the board will meet. Club members are always welcome to sit in and observe the exciting (?) give-and-take.

■ You probably couldn't hear a more inspiring story than the one told today by **Mony Nop**.

Today Mony is a realtor in Livermore and a member of the Rotary Club there. Not too many years ago, at the age of six, he and his family escaped the reign of terror of the Khmer Rouge and the killing fields of Cambodia.

His description of his family's trek through mine fields to get to Thailand was chilling. As were his stories of survival in refugee camps in both Thailand and the Phillipines.



On July 7, 1983 Mony and his family arrived in San Francisco, sponsored as immigrants by a friend of his grandfather's who lived in Arizona. During the trip he saw things we all take for granted —mirrors, escalators, telephones and old-fashioned black and white TV sets—for the very first time. And food, glorious food! Moving on to Arizona, he experienced another first—sleeping on a carpeted floor!

The family eventually moved to

Stockton where there is a sizable Cambodian population. He remembers his first "American" word: apple.

His saga continued—learning English, attending school (skipping grades along the way), wanting to become a police officer and becoming one, attending St. Marys College in Moraga where he graduated with honors, becoming a Realtor and a Rotarian.

He really appreciates life in the





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U.S., and he urged us to stay involved with Rotary's Dictionary Project. He still has the one he "borrowed" from his Third Grade class. It meant the world to him as a boy learning to adapt to his new home.

CLUB CALENDAR


